## Pastor's Notes

### Lenten Series 2015

During my 22 years of ministry, I have met with a few hundred youth for confirmation classes. Many of them at one time or another will have heard about the Means of Grace. What does "means" mean? Means are a method or a way by which or through which something is given or received. The Means of Grace are the ways by which we come to be encountered by and receive God's grace. In the Lutheran Church we talk of Word and Sacrament being the Means of Grace. I want to invite you to explore some of the foundational understandings we have as Lutheran Christians of the Means of Grace. We will share in conversation through the season of Lent on Wednesday evenings. For those who are able, we will meet for a simple soup and bread dinner from 6-6:30 pm in fellowship hall. We will move upstairs to the sanctuary for worship and begin at about 6:40 pm. Worship will be very simple with a hymn or two, a reading, prayers, and an open conversation on five different aspects of the Means of Grace. Our reflections and dialogue will be condensed and submitted to the larger Evangelical Lutheran Church as we seek to understand this one defining aspect of our identity as church together and explore broader discussions of Baptism, Communion, and Hospitality.



### Brief "History" of Stitches:

Despite the absence of any known old written records, it is surely safe to say that the Stitches group has been in existence for at least 75 to 80 years. Harvey remembers his mother Ann being an active member when he was but a lad.

At that time and into the 1960s and 1970's, individuals made squares filled with recycled nylon stockings. The ladies met in an evening each week and brought the squares (made at home) to Irene Powers who was a Stitches. In February of 1998, Clara Wagner issued a call in the bulletin for more members being needed by Stitches and I joined.

Stitches at that time included Frances Bowersox, Marcella Engle, Kay Keller, Mae Kelly, Doris Pence, Irene Powers, Jean Prince, Marjorie Savidge, Clara Wagner, and Evelyn Wagner.

At that time, Stitches not only made quilts but also school kits and rolled bandages. The quilts are created and assembled then in the same way they are today (three thicknesses.)

In 2006, Irene Powers was a guest at Grayson View and I took various materials to her at her request to be assembled. She kept a record of the number of quilts made each year. She asked me to take over that recording.

As of the end of 2014 the Stitches have made over 1150 quilts and 590 school kits and filled numerous cartons of rolled bandages.



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## *Quarterly Leadership Meeting Notes: January 15<sup>th</sup>, 2015*

Scout Sunday is February 8<sup>th</sup> at the 10:30 service. Worship and Music along with Pastor is looking for ways to involve the scouts in the service.

Ash Wednesday services will be at noon and at 7pm on Wednesday, February 18<sup>th</sup>. At the 7:00 service the SU Chorale will provide music from a mass they have been rehearsing.

Lenten worship will begin with Soup and Bread from 6-6:30. Worship will begin at 6:40 – 7:30 in the sanctuary with chairs set up near the altar and utilizing the first few pews. The worship service will be focused on creating a dialog exploring the Means of Grace – providing feedback of the congregation's responses to the ELCA.

Nancy Martin would like to coordinate another Easter Egg Hunt on April 4. April Metzger agreed to help. It was noted the event provided fun and visibility within the community.

The spring musical, "You're a Good Man Charlie Brown", is set for Saturday, April 18<sup>th</sup> at 7pm and Sunday, April 19<sup>th</sup> at 3pm. Tickets for the event will be \$5, attempting to recoup the cost of acquiring the rights to the production. The event is intended to be a fundraiser for those traveling to Detroit this summer. They are still looking for help with ads, sponsors and possibly a meal. Nancy Martin is thinking of coordinating a meal – something easy like last year's chicken and waffles.

The youth traveling to Detroit are busy studying material for the event. The attendees are Kim, Robin, Pastor, Raechel, Hannah, Markie and Sarah. Cost effective travel arrangements through Lutheran Hands coordinated by Lower Susquehanna will allow participants to stay an extra night to be involved in a Detroit service project.

Considering St. Paul's UCC early connection to Sharon, a fall choral fest is being considered. This might include combined choirs and hand bells.

The outreach programs of Meals for Seals and Rejoicing Spirits continues to gain support. The expansion of the Meals for Seals program into the intermediate schools is being discussed today, Friday. The program continues to can support through the community. Rejoicing Spirits is the 4<sup>th</sup> Sunday of the month at 6:30 at the Church of the Nazarene. Sharon's support to this outreach is evident in members involved in providing music. Nancy Martin is coordinating a "Cookie Bake" with the Sunday school children on January 25<sup>th</sup> to send to this month's worship service. She will contact the coordinator to make arrangements.

During the coming months Adult Education will hopefully include outside speakers like Carol Parowski who will lead a discussion on the Stewardship of Life on Sunday, January 25<sup>th</sup> during the regular Sunday school hour. Contact has been made with SU's Rabbi, a Geisinger grief counselor, and SU's diversity office.

There will be no Confirmation this year as there are no 9<sup>th</sup> graders. Pentecost service will be led by Lowell Leitzel as Pastor is a participant in an out of town wedding.

## **TEAM UPDATES:**

Christian Education is in the final stages of formalizing Sharon's Child Protection Policy, which will reflect new legal requirement as of January 1<sup>st</sup>. (Background checks are required for any church staff or volunteer who interacts with children.) The policy addresses safety for children and youth and procedures) Pastor has obtained the new curriculum for spring noting he will meet with April Metzger to make selections from the materials. The plan is similar to the current curriculum which, according to Nancy Martin, has been enjoyed by both the teachers and the students – noting an increase in attendance.

Hospitality will be sending out notes to visitors with a standardized message prepared by pastor and printed. Personalized comments are encouraged. Coffee hour between the services was discussed and will held the first Sunday of the month beginning in February. Jeff Whitman suggested we call the time "Holy Grounds." Mary Pendley will be responsible for hosting/getting hosts. Pastor encouraged the use of homemade goods prepared by parishioners but not a necessity. A free will basket will be provided to help recover the cost of the coffee.

A stewardship resource event will be held at United Lutheran in early March from 9AM until noon. It is the hope that Sharon will send 5 people to this event. Contact pastor if you would be willing. Thrivent will also have some upcoming opportunities. Nancy Martin is planning a stewardship lesson with the Sunday school children, encourage saving pennies during Lent to purchase supplies for Meals for Seals.

The Mission Endowment Fund made distributions to CAA (for family education), Rejoicing Spirits (music and equipment), Kathryn's Closet – St. Matthews (for the cost of acquiring laundry detergents that are given away free) and \$1200 as an Emergency Fund for Pastor to be used in his discretion.

The Property Team is looking for a new chair as Paul Grimes has stepped down.

Worship and Music continue to seek volunteers to help with worship including training new volunteers. They are looking at possible summer hymn festival including some period music, recitals and a talent show, related to the 225<sup>th</sup> anniversary.

The Finance Team is excited to have arranged for a review of the church's finances during late spring/early summer. The team is very happy with how the finances are being handled, noting the congregation should be assured this review is to have an outside independent look at the financial procedures and recommend ways to improve.

The Personnel Team continues to provide support for staff development for which Pastor is grateful.

Social Ministry will be contacted via email to Don Housley to identify where the Lenten offerings will be sent (usually split between a local ministry and a national/international ministry).

Pastor, with the guidance of Mutual Ministry and Personnel, has developed a program outline for upcoming forums to discuss the ministry needs of the congregation. He will present this program to the Council on Monday. The forums will focus on member's perceptions of ministry opportunities and their willingness to participate in those ministries. Pastor will conduct small family sessions attempting to analyze how we can better design and provide family ministry. These forums are intended to gather information necessary to address Sharon's personnel needs with the passing of Pastor Lindquist, the end of Vicar Rick's service and Robin's change to ¼ time. (Mutual ministry will help facilitate the forums within Sharon's Teams.)

## **USS ARK**

### **News of God's People in Action from the Upper Susquehanna Synod, ELCA**

#### **2014 Year in Review**

Here is the *USS Ark's* annual look back at mission highlights of the past year:

**STAFF TRANSITIONS:** In January, Rev. Barbara Jeanne (B.J.) Collins was installed as the synod's new part-time Director for Evangelical Mission (DEM), under call from the ELCA. Later in the year, Collins took on the additional duties of a half-time assistant to the bishop position, when synod bid farewell to Pastors Karl-John and Beth Ann Stone, who served in that role for the last seven years. The Stones accepted a call to be part of the pastoral staff at Southwood Lutheran Church in Lincoln, Nebraska. Also as part of the staff restructuring following the departures of Revs. Stone, the conference deans took on duties involving walking with congregations in the call process.

**SYNOD ASSEMBLY:** The Annual Synod Assembly was held at Susquehanna University in June. The theme was "Listen to the Spirit." The consecration of the synod's first diaconal minister, the start to a new fund for leaders, and a resolution regarding hydraulic fracturing highlighted the two-day event.

**"GOD'S WORK. OUR HANDS" DAY OF SERVICE:** As part of a national observance of the ELCA, several synod congregations participated this year in "God's work. Our hands" Day of Service on September 7. Volunteers took time to offer service to others in their community, including a joint effort by congregations of the Buffalo Valley Conference.

**DAY AT KNOEBELS:** About 120 people gathered on a beautiful fall day on September 14 for Upper Susquehanna Synod Day at Knoebel's Grove Amusement Resort. Members of congregations throughout the synod gathered at Pavilion P-5 for fellowship, snacks, and vespers.

**CAMP MOUNT LUTHER:** Campers to our synod camp this past summer learned about the church year, as they studied under the theme, "Living in God's Time." During the fall, the camp faced some financial challenges that were relieved by generous giving during a \$25,000 challenge grant offered by an anonymous donor.

**MEDIATION SKILLS TRAINING:** About 40 people participated in a Mediation Skills Training Institute (MSTI), a ministry of the Lombard Mennonite Peace Center. The MSTI was sponsored by the Bishop's Reconciliation Team and held at St. Luke Lutheran Church, Bloomsburg, in August. Each day consisted of information sharing, role-playing, and sessions led by Richard Blackburn, Lombard Mennonite Center Executive Director.

**CHICK LANE HERE:** Charles "Chick" Lane was the speaker for the 2014 Bishop's Day for Rostered Leaders and at an event for lay leaders. Lane lifted up the connection of faith and finances in the Christian life and how important it is to talk about money in congregations.

**NEW GERMAN BISHOP:** Bishop Gisela Bornowski, new Bishop of Kirchenkreis Ansbach-Würzburg was installed in March, in St. Johannis Kirche, Würzburg. Rev. Dr. Lois D Martin represented Bishop Robert L. Driesen and the synod at the installation. Martin participated in the "Blessing and Laying on of Hands" and actively participated in the Eucharistic liturgy.
