STATIONS OF THE CROSS

The Stations of the Cross have been offered to the elementary through high school classes for at least three consecutive years. The children and adult leaders' responses to the stations have been somber, curious, uplifting and insightful. It follows Jesus walk from the crown of thorns to the ripping of the Temple curtain. The stations are created to use all five senses to experience events that happened in Jesus' last hours. Even though the stations remain the same, the responses are different for each person every year.

Pastor's Reflection

Ho, everyone who thirsts, come to the waters; and you that have no money, come, buy and eat! Come, buy wine and milk without money and without price.

For as the rain and the snow come down from heaven, and do not return there until they have watered the earth, making it bring forth and sprout, giving seed to the sower and bread to the eater, so shall my word be that goes out from my mouth; it shall not return to me empty, but it shall accomplish that which I purpose, and succeed in the thing for which I sent it.

(Isaiah 55:1, 10-11)

Alright, so maybe we don't want any more snow and are not looking forward to any rain this spring, but we know that it is important for the ground, the growing season, and the water table. In spite of our long winter and all the water and ice currently around us, the image makes sense and we know that these seasonal cycles are necessary for life and for the farms and animals around us. We might not need the reminder about the water cycle and its effect on the world around us—or maybe we do for the ways it might call us to care for those waters and the land around us.

But we certainly need the reminder of how, like the water, God's word goes out from God's mouth and does not return empty, but accomplishes that for which God purposes and succeeds in the thing for which God sends it. That word waters us, nourishes us and causes our faith to sprout and grow. God's word is not empty letters on a page, but is a living engagement with the story and witnesses of faith and God's action. God's word is embodied in Jesus who bears witness to the heart of God and to the purpose of reconciliation and new life. God's word comes as breath that breathes life into us and teaches us and causes new growth and pushes us into the world as light and compassion and love.

In the Lenten season as we continue to journey together in the springtime of faith, may your heart and soul be renewed by God as you thirst for living water and for the growth that comes in the word of God poured out for you.

Reasons to go to Summer Camp for preschool through high school

Campers have been enjoying camping at Mount Luther since 1963. Camp is an important part in the development of anyone who enjoys our programs. Why? Because at church camp you will get to:

- **Grow in your faith:** We believe that faith is caught, not taught, so we spend time Gathering and Reflecting On God's Word through readings, songs, games and demonstrations. Our GROW Time this summer is based on the theme "A Love That Never Ends," as you will consider what it means to live in the world as people chosen by God, by studying five heroes of the Old Testament.
- **Make new friends:** Some of your best friends can be those that you meet at camp. Our intentional Christian community is a great place to meet people like you, with similar beliefs, who will accept you for who you are!

A Brief History of Camp Mt. Luther

Mount Luther was a response to the need for a place to provide small group camping experiences in the former Central Pennsylvania Synod of the Lutheran Church in America. Lutherans were outgrowing the facilities at Camp Juniata near Milroy, and despite a successful camping program at Camp Susquehanna held on the campus of Susquehanna University each summer, it was the wish of the synod's Commission on Camping to have a local central to this part of the synod. The synod purchased the former Buffalo Valley Fruit Farm in western Union County, and the camp was dedicated in 1963. When the camping season began that year, the A-Frame cabins in what is now Maple Village were not yet complete. Pine Village and the Administration Center were added in 1967. The camp was part of the Lutheran Camping Corporation of Central Pennsylvania from the mid- 1970s until the early 1990s. During that time period, a capital funds campaign helped make improvements to the camp, including a swimming pool and winterization of the cabins. The corporation operated Mount Luther, Nawakwa, in Arendtsville, and Kirchenwald in Colebrook. With the formation of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America in 1988, the Upper Susquehanna Synod decided to bring local control to the camp and the Camp Mount Luther Corporation was formed in late 1990. Since then, Mount Luther has seen an increase in use and programs from the people of this synod. In 2004, the Evergreen Center was constructed as a result of the need for more dining and activity space. In 2006, the camp began a partnership relationship with the Episcopal Diocese of Central Pennsylvania (ECUSA), offering a joint camping week for both Episcopalians and Lutherans.

Worship Notes


